WATER QUALITY MEETS ALL REGULATORY STANDARDS

n the year 2017, the Germantown Water Utility (GWU) conducted all DNR required tests to ensure the safety and quality of the drinking water delivered to our customers. All laboratory analysis indicated that the water provided by the Utility met all Federal and State drinking water standards.

This report summarizes the water quality provided to customers in 2017. It also includes details about where your water comes from, what has been detected in your water and how that compares to regulatory standards. We are committed to providing you with useful information.

SPECIAL HEALTH INFORMATION AVAILABLE

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons

who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. HEALTH EFFECTS FOR ANY CONTANINANTS WITH MCL VIOLATION/ACTION LEVEL EXCEEDANCES

Infants and young children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure.

Additional health Information

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Germantown Water

Utility is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. SOURCE OF GERMANTOWN'S DRINKING WATER

ermantown draws drinking water from both the sandstone and limestone aquifers, a groundwater source, via six wells. The GWU owns the land around these wells and restricts any activity that could lead to contamination. As water flows

through rivers and lakes and over landsurfaces, naturally occurring substances may be dissolved into the water. Animals and human activities also may affect the water. These substances are then called contaminants. Not all contaminants are harmful.

For example, the following contaminants might exist in



"untreated" water. Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals; biological contaminants, such as viruses, protozoa and bacteria; organic chemicals from industrial or petroleum use: pesticides and herbicides; and radioactive materials. To ensure tap water is safe to drink, the EPA and WDNR prescribe regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The GWU is in compliance with all EPA and WDNR standards.



DEFINITIONS

AL = Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set as close to the MCLG's as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected health risk. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

MFL: million fibers per liter

MRDL: Maximum residual disinfectant level: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDL6: Maximum residual disinfectant level goal: The level

of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

ITU: Nephelometric Turbidity Units

pci/L: Picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity).

ppm: Parts per million, or micrograms per liter (mg/l).

ph: Parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l).

ppt: parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter.

parts perquadrillion, or picograms per liter

TCR: Total Coliform Rule.

11: Treatment Technique: a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Each contaminant range is from no detect (nd) to the maximum reported value.
